## PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



Dear Neighbor:

Every year, when I start writing down the new date, I sometimes respond with a little disbelief – can it really be 2012? Twelve years into the “new millennium”? Twelve years since Y2K, when all the computers were going to stop working (and didn't)? But a new year has begun again – and I'm glad we (you and I) are here to enjoy it. And I'm pleased to be able to start the year with a positive report.

**Shared Services – Something Important:** Perhaps you have already seen the reports in the newspapers, but, if not, elsewhere in this issue is an article detailing the recently-announced agreement between the Village and the Glencoe Park District relating to the commencement of a pilot program for certain shared services. It may not sound like much, but I think this is a pretty big deal.

## VILLAGE AND PARK DISTRICT INITIATE A SHARED SERVICES PROGRAM

Beginning in September 2010, the Village and the Park District began discussions and evaluated options for sharing certain services in order to reduce costs. After months of study and review by their respective staffs, the Village and Park Boards approved resolutions to implement a shared services “pilot program” beginning March 1, 2012.

In consideration of the benefits that will accrue to the Village, the Park District and the broader Glencoe community, the following shared services are designated for implementation as part of a FY 2013 pilot program:

1. The Village will perform all vehicle maintenance and repairs of Park District vehicles;
2. The Park District trees will be logged into the database of the Village's Tree Management Software and the Village will perform routine maintenance (trimming, removal, and inspection) of Park District trees;
3. The Park District will install and maintain the Village Holiday Lighting program; and
4. The Park District will maintain lawn areas of the Village.

These items are in addition to programs that have been in effect for a number of years, including the Park District access to the Village fuel dispensing system and water testing conducted by the Village Water Filtration Plant to test water quality for determination of beach use.

The opportunities to initiate shared services programs for what may be characterized as producing efficiencies, whether or not producing “substantial” savings, will provide the framework for expanding options for the future. The Village and the Park District believe that these shared service initiatives, as pilot programs for Fiscal Year 2013, may be just the starting point of opportunities for other shared service programs in the near future. Other potential opportunities that will be receiving additional review include vehicle and equipment sharing and storage, combined tree purchase program, garbage collection services, information technology planning, procurement and utilization and consolidation of some of the newsletters of the governing bodies in the community.

This pilot program will be reviewed by respective operational staff on a monthly basis and a formal administrative review will be performed at the mid-point of Fiscal Year 2013. The Village of Glencoe and the Glencoe Park District have made a commitment to find and develop meaningful cost savings to the community by these shared services initiatives.

## THE INSIDE STORY...

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The Village began discussions on this topic with the Park District just about a year ago, with both parties sharing the goal of providing their respective services in the most effective and efficient way possible. There was also a shared recognition that any savings would be of benefit, and that – since our taxpayers are the same – it did not matter where those savings ended up. Whether in the Village’s budget or the Park District’s – the same people would benefit.

We are all used to the multiplicity of governments that exist in Illinois. In Glencoe, we pay real estate taxes to at least eleven different local and county entities (Village; Park District; Glencoe Schools; New Trier HS; New Trier Township; Glencoe Library; Oakton Comm. College; Cook County; Cook County Forest Preserve; North Shore Mosquito Control; Metro Water Reclamation). And of course there is the State itself, and probably some others.

It isn’t done this way in other places. Illinois has more governments - over 50% more – than the next highest state (including jumbos like California and Texas). Multiple governmental entities like we have in Illinois simply can’t be the most efficient way to deliver the necessary governmental services.

I don’t think we are about to change the basic way Illinois structures its communities. But we can do whatever is possible to look at our governmental entities, combine the activities which can be combined, and provide efficiently delivered service to our citizens.

Because it is somewhat “radical” (i.e., in Glencoe, not done before), the Village and the Park District decided early on to move deliberately on this project. What we have begun is a pilot program – and, in some ways, it addresses only the “low-hanging fruit”. Village and Park District staff are confident that the service combinations being proposed will prove workable. Because of the very nature of the projects, it is hard to project savings in specific dollar amounts, or how and where those savings will be realized. We should be able to have a better idea of those results after the programs have been implemented. But make no mistake: so far as we know, the Village and the Park District have not previously agreed to share resources and personnel in this manner, and from a longer-term perspective, I believe that there will be some significant possible savings to be achieved.

What is absolutely critical to the success of any program such as this is a shared commitment to that success. We all have seen evidence, at national and state levels, of the difficulties that can arise when seeking cooperation (much less consolidation of service) between governmental entities. I believe we in Glencoe can overcome those kinds of difficulties, at least when dealing with our own local governments. Our respective entities are served – and controlled - by volunteer Boards. We sit on those Boards – and we can make sure that the best interests of Glencoe’s citizenry receive top priority.

The agreements reached between the Village and Park District are not only examples of that shared commitment at the level of the Village Board and the Park Board, but also evidence of the hard work of the respective senior staff members who put together the joint proposals. They deserve our support and thanks. And we are looking to them to make the plan work.

By the way: the Park District isn’t the only entity with the wisdom to look at service efficiencies. During the past year, the Village has been working with the Library on a number of items that, over time, will show such results – including a migration of the Library’s older financial software onto the modernized platform employed by the Village. And, as noted in the Memo article, the Glencoe School District is also participating in the review of a possible consolidation (or partial consolidation) of the various entity newsletters.

So – the year begins with what I consider some pretty good news.

**Electric Aggregation:** Please spend a little time reviewing the information contained in this issue regarding the matter of “electric aggregation”. This relates directly to a referendum question you will see on the ballot for the election to be held next March 20.

Illinois law now allows each of us to purchase electricity from a provider other than Commonwealth Edison. ComEd delivers that electricity over its grid, and charges whatever the agreed rate is (plus a delivery charge). We have all received solicitations in the mail, from various electricity providers, seeking to sell power at specified rates they say will be below those charged by ComEd. As individuals, we have no ability to negotiate those rates.

The state law allows each village or city, if approved by referendum, to negotiate a group rate with any particular provider that would be applicable for all of its citizens (except any who chose to “opt out”). The ballot referendum in March will, if it passes, allow us to act in that role.

The Village Board unanimously approved the referendum question, and has also agreed (again unanimously, but of course subject to a favorable referendum vote) to join with seven other North Shore communities in a consortium to negotiate with the various electricity providers to obtain a contract for their respective residents.

All of this appears to me to be a positive opportunity to reduce our residential electricity costs. At this point, there is certainly no harm in going forward. That does require a favorable vote on the referendum, however, so please keep that in mind in March.

## RECENT VILLAGE BOARD ACTION

The following are key actions taken by the Village Board during the months of November and December:

- Approved an Agreement for Health Insurance Brokerage and Consulting Services - The Village Board approved a two-year agreement with Corporate Benefit Consultants, Inc. for the period between December 1, 2011 and December 1, 2013 in an amount of \$60,000.
- Approved Landmark Designation for the Property Located at 350 Sunrise Circle - Based on the analysis and recommendation of the Historic Preservation Commission, the Village Board approved Landmark Designation for this residence.
- Approved an Agreement for Engineering Services - The Village Board approved the Engineering Services Agreement for a Stormwater Drainage Study with Engineering Resource Associates, Inc. in an amount not-to-exceed \$19,552.
- Approved Resolution R-24-2011 - The Village Board adopted a Resolution authorizing the execution of an Intergovernmental Agreement establishing the North Shore Electricity Aggregation Consortium.
- Approved the Purchase of a 65-foot Aerial Tower Truck - The Village Board approved the purchase of one (1) 65-foot Aerial Truck from Altec Industries, Inc. of Indianapolis, IN for a total cost, including the trade-in of existing Unit #9, of \$161,544.
- Approved a Resolution to Initiate a Pilot Program with the Glencoe Park District - The Village Board adopted a Resolution of the Village of Glencoe to Initiate a Pilot Program to Provide Shared Services (see story on page 1).
- Conducted a Public Hearing and Approved Ordinance No. 2011-18-3299 - Annually, the Village Board conducts a public hearing to receive public comments prior to approving the Tax Levy Ordinance.
- Approved Ordinance No. 2011-20-3301 - The Village Board approved the recommended changes to the Zoning Code as recommended by the Zoning Commission on Arbors/Pergolas and adopted an Ordinance amending Sections 5-101 and 8-302 of the Village Code.
- Reviewed the Village's Recommended Fiscal Year 2013 Budget - The Village Board reviewed the recommended 2013 budget that is expected to receive final approval at the February 2012 Village Board meeting.

The following items are tentatively scheduled for the January and February Village Board meetings:



- Continue review and final approval of the Village's Budget for Fiscal Year 2013.
- Continue review and final approval of the Glencoe Golf Club budget for Fiscal Year 2013.

## PREPARATION OF FISCAL YEAR 2013 BUDGET UNDERWAY

The current Village budget year (Fiscal Year 2012) comes to a close on February 29, 2012. It is projected that revenues in the operating funds (General Fund, Water Fund and Garbage Fund) will be \$118,211 less than the Fiscal Year 2012 Budget, and expenditures will be \$1,968 less than the FY 2012 Budget. These projections exclude financial activity from Illinois Environmental Protection Agency (IEPA) loan program for water system improvements.

The Village is working to formulate a final budget for Fiscal Year 2013 (March 1, 2012 to February 28, 2013) that recognizes the current economic factors that have impacted the current budget and the desire to maintain quality services.

The most significant single revenue source for the Village is property tax. As a non-home rule community, the Village is bound by the property tax extension limitation law. The proposed levy of taxes to fund Village operations during Fiscal Year 2013 actually reflects a decrease of \$550,610 or 5.24% from the taxes extended to fund the prior year budget. That decrease arises because the property taxes also reflect amounts to service outstanding Village indebtedness, and during this past year the Village retired some existing long-term bonds.

# ELECTRICAL AGGREGATION

## Frequently Asked Questions

### **Q: What is Deregulation?**

A: On December 16, 1997, the State of Illinois implemented a plan to deregulate Commonwealth Edison (“ComEd”). Under this plan, ComEd no longer generates electricity for its customers, but continues to provide power generated by others through its distribution system. Deregulation means that power can be purchased through any of the twenty-two (22) power suppliers that are presently approved by the Illinois Commerce Commission (ICC).

### **Q: What is Electric Aggregation?**

A: Electric Aggregation is a program that allows local governments to bundle – or aggregate – residential and small commercial retail electric accounts, in order to seek bids for a cheaper source of power. Currently, ComEd customers receive electricity at a price set each year by the Illinois Power Agency, a governmental body that secures electricity on the wholesale market on behalf of ComEd. By aggregating the electric load of the entire community and then soliciting and negotiating competitive bids from suppliers, a municipality can secure even more aggressive rates for the benefit of individual customers. Since 1999, large industrial and commercial customers have used this option to reduce electricity costs.

### **Q: How does the program work?**

A: Under state law, a municipality must place a referendum on the ballot asking voters to give the municipal government the authority to aggregate electric accounts and seek bids for power generation. Once voters have approved a referendum, a municipality must hold at least two public hearings to discuss and create an aggregation plan. Once a plan is in place, municipal staff, with assistance from energy experts, prepares and publicizes the appropriate bid documents. Only energy suppliers certified and regulated by the ICC may respond. The bid that comes closest to achieving the goals of the aggregation plan can then be accepted. However, if none of the bids meet the plan’s goals, there is no obligation to accept one, and the aggregated accounts continue to receive power from ComEd at prevailing rates. A resident or small business has no obligation to participate and could choose to opt-out of the program altogether.

### **Q: What is the referendum on the March 20, 2012 Election Ballot?**

A: Voters will be asked whether or not the Village of Glencoe should have authority to arrange for the supply of electricity for its residential and small commercial retail customers who have not opted out of such a program.

### **Q: What are the benefits of aggregation?**

A: The most important benefit is the opportunity for residents and small businesses to save money on electric supply costs.

### **Q: Am I obligated to participate?**

A: No. Any account holder may opt-out of the program and remain on ComEd’s supply service rate. The opportunity to opt-out is available up to the time of program implementation. Customers will receive notice information of the opt-out period, who to contact, and how they must communicate their intention to opt-out.

### **Q: What is ComEd’s role in this program?**

A: ComEd distributes electricity, but does not generate it. As the local electricity distributor, ComEd is responsible for infrastructure, like power lines that bring electricity into homes and businesses, responding to outages and billing. ComEd will continue to bill customers for electric usage regardless of the supplier. ComEd, by law, will still be paid to distribute the power to homes and businesses, and handle any emergency repairs.

### **Q: If I participate, will I get two bills - one from ComEd and another from the selected energy supplier?**

A: No. ComEd will remain responsible for billing customers for all electricity, regardless of the electric supplier. The only change would be the name of the electricity provider on the electricity supply portion of the bill.

### **Q: If voters approve the referendum, how long will it be before the program is implemented?**

A: State law requires certain steps be followed to approve and implement an Electric Aggregation Program. If voters give the Village government authority to pursue aggregation, two public hearings must be held to gather citizen input for an aggregation plan that outlines goals such as savings targets. Once the plan is created and adopted, municipal staff will seek competitive bids from energy suppliers. If a bid is received that meets the goals of the plan, a contract would then be negotiated and approved by the Village. In all likelihood, full implementation of the new program would be achieved sometime during mid-2012.

# SNOW AND ICE CONTROL

## IMPORTANT FACTS AND INFORMATION



As we put the holidays behind and look ahead to winter driving it is a good opportunity to go over some key information on the Village's efforts to keep streets and sidewalks open during the winter months. The Village has a Snow and Ice Control Plan that is implemented each year by the Public Works Department. The goal of the Department is to have all of the streets cleared and pavement in a safe and passable condition within 8 hours following the conclusion of a snowfall event. The Village has been divided into six plowing and salting routes, and within each route, streets are assigned a priority so that major streets are cleared first followed by side streets and cul-de-sacs. Snow and ice control efforts are dictated by a number of factors including the total snowfall, duration of the storm, temperature and the moisture content of the snow.

### *Duration Makes a Difference*

The faster a storm moves through the Village, the better. It's generally easier and requires less manpower, equipment and salt to clear six inches of snow that falls in eight hours than three inches spread out over 24 hours.

### *Moisture Content of Snow*

The higher the moisture content of snow, the more difficult it is to remove. A 10-inch accumulation of dry, fluffy snow is easier to remove than 4 or 5 inches of heavy, wet snow. Freezing rain can turn a street into a skating rink within minutes and hampers Village salt crews if pavement has not been pre-treated.

### *Timing Matters*

Storms that begin in late evening and end in the early morning hours generally can be cleared from the street in time for morning commuter traffic. Storms that arrive during the morning or evening rush hour hamper snow removal efforts considerably as the Village plow trucks have to navigate around slow moving vehicular traffic.

### *Salting Streets*

Keeping streets cleared of snow and ice requires the use of de-icer products as well as equipment. The Village uses road salt, liquid calcium chloride and brine to supplement its snow and ice control efforts. Road salt is most effective at temperatures above 25 degrees and less effective at temperatures below 10 degrees. Liquid calcium chloride is used to make road salt more effective at temperatures below 25 degrees. Brine (salt dissolved in water) is used as a pre-treatment prior to an oncoming storm to provide a barrier on road surfaces that helps to prevent adhesion of snow and ice to pavement. Timing is very important in the use of salt and brine to insure most effective results.

The Village plows and salts streets on a priority basis. Priority one streets: Dundee Road, Sheridan Road, Green Bay Road, etc. are cleared and salted first to maintain safe collector routes for all vehicular traffic. Side streets are cleared next and salt is used primarily at intersections, curves and hills. The Village's policy is to control salt usage to reduce the impact on infrastructure, equipment and the environment, while still maintaining safe winter driving conditions. Cul-de-sacs and dead end streets are plowed using smaller trucks and are further down the priority list.

### *Sidewalks and Driveways*

Sidewalks are plowed by the Village only after a snowfall of 3 inches or more. Like street plowing, priority is given to major routes and sidewalks around schools and in the downtown business district. Residents are encouraged to clear snow from the sidewalk around their homes to prevent ice build-up along public sidewalks.

Driveways are often impacted by snow removal efforts on the street. Village crews will try to clear snow to the curb as soon after the storm as possible; however, during heavy snowfalls, plows may run as many as 3 or 4 passes to clear snow, resulting in snow being pushed across the base of all driveways. Consider this before you begin to clear your driveway. Also, remember to throw snow being removed from your driveway to the "downstream" side (the right side as you face the street). This will reduce the impact that street plowing has on your driveway access.

## Help Keep Fire Hydrants Clear of Snow

The Village asks that residents help to keep fire hydrants accessible for the Public Safety Department by keeping clear space around all sides of any hydrant in proximity to your home as you do your shoveling or snow blowing. Your private contractor can help in this effort as well.

Fire hydrants that are buried or blocked by piles of snow may result in the Public Safety Department not being able to locate them in an emergency. If you notice a damaged or leaking fire hydrant, please contact the Public Works Department at (847) 835-4111.
