PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



Dear Neighbor:

As we head into fall, I hope everyone has been able to enjoy the summer. From the Village government side, however, this has been something of a "season of discontent".

I've noted before that the most difficult part of the job of Village Trustee (and Village President) is the need to balance the competing interests of various constituencies - two groups of neighbors, or the business community or other institutional "citizens", or the interests of the community as a whole. Almost always, the ultimate decision leaves some people unhappy. That isn't anyone's goal, but it does happen.

Here's a brief report on recent issues - as noted, some resolved and others yet to be.

Golf Course Project: Almost exactly one year ago, we began an examination of two long-standing Glencoe problems: finding financial

GLENCOE'S SUSTAINABLE COMMITMENT

The Village of Glencoe is reaching beyond Village Hall to share our commitment to sustainable living. While the Village has pursued sustainable efforts internally for some time, recent direction from the Village Board asked members of the Plan Commission to develop a community-wide focus. The completion of the Sustainability Study in July 2009 served as a perfect launch point for pursuing the goal of actively engaging residents in these eco-friendly practices. After several months of study, including two forums, the Commission identified four key tasks necessary for completing this goal. Over the course of this ambitious undertaking, the Plan Commission aspires to:

1. Develop a user-friendly resource on the Village's website for residents and students to learn more about best practices.
2. Form a "Green Alliance," collaborating with public bodies, community groups, organizations and boards to promote broader sustainable programs.
3. Conduct an internal audit of Village regulations to identify any barriers that may inadvertently impede sustainable efforts.
4. Pursue pilot projects that educate and encourage residents to undertake sustainable measures in their own households.

The Village's next step in achieving these goals is to welcome the addition of a new "*Green Corner*" beginning in the November/December *Glencoe Memo*. Look for the "*Green Corner*" to learn more about what the Village is doing to promote sustainability, and what you can do to help. The "Green Corner" will be a resource where residents are encouraged to share in the enthusiasm of taking mutual steps towards fostering a sustainable future.

Be sure to check the "*Green Corner*" of the November/December *Memo* for more details, and for an update on the Glencoe website, which will be an interactive tool for residents to learn how to take action in our community! ▼

COMPREHENSIVE ANNUAL FINANCIAL REPORT

Fiscal Year 2010

The Comprehensive Annual Financial Report (CAFR) provides valuable data to the Village Board, staff and residents. It is completed in conjunction with the annual audit.

For the fiscal year ended February 28, 2010, the Village's governmental funds totaled \$17.7 Million in revenue. Of that amount, the General Fund revenue totaled \$13.4 Million. The four largest sources of revenue are property tax, sales tax, income tax and utility tax. A substantial portion of the Village's revenue is derived from sources subject to economic conditions and is beyond the Village's control (i.e. sales tax, income tax, building permits).

The Village's General Fund reported an increase of \$97,279 in fund balance for the year. General Fund revenues were \$433,642 less than budgeted. *(Continued on page 8)*

resources to renovate the old clubhouse at the Glencoe Golf Club, and filling the long-recognized need for “empty-nester” housing in Glencoe. The proposal involved selling a piece of the Course for development as empty-nester housing, with the proceeds to be used to renovate the Clubhouse and reconfigure the Course.

Trustee committees were established to review the project, which presented a multiplicity of issues. A consultant was retained to review some of those matters, and his report was received in May.

To make a long story short, the “Golf Course Development Committee”, after reviewing the consultant’s report and listening to significant concerns raised by residents, unanimously recommended that we not proceed further with the idea of the sale and development of the specified portion of the Course. The full Village Board accepted that recommendation. However, we are planning to establish a task force to continue to search for funding opportunities for the needed Clubhouse renovation.

Botanic Garden Fence: Last spring the Chicago Botanic Garden requested that the Village grant a height variation so that the Garden could install a perimeter fence around its property that would be high enough to keep deer out of the Garden. The proposed fence directly impacted residents living along the southern end of Longmeadow and the west side of Pebblewood, the Glencoe Golf Course, and, perhaps to some extent, all of the Village in the sense that the deer excluded from the Garden might wander around the rest of the Village.

After significant discussion, and cooperation by the Garden in relocating some of the proposed fence, the Board granted the variance except as to the Longmeadow/Pebblewood area – which was deferred for later determination. The approved fencing was installed during the summer.

With the involvement and sponsorship of the Village, the Garden has had meetings with at least some of the affected Longmeadow and Pebblewood residents. As of this writing, I am advised that they are continuing a dialog with the hopes of reaching a solution that meets the legitimate needs of the Garden without unreasonably impacting the residents. I certainly hope that can occur.

Private Roadways: In looking for ways to reduce expenditures, the Village Board learned last winter that the Village has historically provided snowplow service, and other limited repairs, to ten of the “private roadways” located in the Village, without any specific charges for that service. (There are some ten other private roadways that serve three or more residences, but which have not historically received these services. No one has been able to determine why this difference exists.) No other communities in the area provide plowing or repair service

to private roadways without specific additional charge. “Private roadways” are, legally, paved portions of private property that are subject to easements in favor of the other users of the roadway.

Last winter, the Board determined as a policy matter not to continue these services, which staff has estimated cost from \$15,000-\$20,000 in a year with average snowfall. The Board notified all of the affected residents of its decision and specified an agenda item at its June meeting to hear resident input. There was quite a bit – all from the private roadway residents, and all in favor of continuing the previous procedure.

In light of the views expressed, the Board deferred the matter to its August meeting. At the August meeting, the Board unanimously confirmed its decision of last winter. However, the Board directed staff to establish a program where the Village, if requested, will, for an agreed-upon fee, continue with the historically-provided service.

There were a great many issues and concerns raised during this discussion – too many to review here. Interested parties can review those discussions by watching the video of the June and August meetings (easily available through the Village website).

Steep Slope Regulation; Cell Phone Towers: OMG! (as they say) – I’m out of space, and there are two more still unresolved items to discuss. Very briefly:

After two years of review and many meetings at which minimal negative input was received, a large number of residents came to protest proposed rules governing new construction on Glencoe’s “steep slope” bluff and ravine properties. Significant misinformation about the new rules had apparently been distributed, and the Board tabled its review. The Board later agreed to bring back the proposal for reconsideration, in its previous final form, and directed staff to prepare for public distribution a more detailed summary of this complex set of regulations. The matter is still pending.

The Board is also considering proposals to lease public space for two “flagpole-type” cell phone transmission towers – one next to the materials storage area near the ninth tee of the Glencoe Golf Course, and the other, more controversial, in the storage area next to the railroad tracks running north from Harbor Street. As to the latter, the phone company has modified an earlier proposal in an attempt to respond to some neighbor concerns, but the matter is not yet resolved.

All of these matters have ended – or may end – with some folks unhappy with the result. I wish that could be avoided, but the necessary “balancing” doesn’t always permit that to happen.

VILLAGE BOARD MEETINGS

The following are key actions by the Village Board during the months of July and August:

- Decreased the number of C-1 liquor licenses – The restaurant located at 91 Green Bay was issued a C-1 liquor license. That restaurant is now closed, and the Board approved an ordinance to reduce the number of C-1 licenses by one.
- Approved an Ordinance granting preliminary and final subdivision plat approval for the consolidation of 488 and 490 Park Avenue – The Village Board approved the final plat of consolidation as well as an ordinance approving the consolidation.
- Approved the purchase of a truck for the Garbage Division of Public Works – The Fiscal Year 2011 budget includes funds for a 1-ton dump truck. The Board approved the purchase through the Northwest Municipal Conference Joint Purchasing Cooperative.
- Approved Landmark Designation for the properties located at 625 Washington Avenue and 199 Beach Road – Based on the analysis and recommendation of the Historic Preservation Commission, the Village Board approved Landmark Designation for these properties.
- Approved the Fiscal Year 2010 Financial Audit – As required by law, a comprehensive financial report is completed annually that audits the Village's financial process and findings. The Board approved the Fiscal Year 2010 report. (See article on page 1.)
- Discussed modifications to Village services for private roadways – The Board agreed to retain the budget commitment to modify Village services to private roadways and to offer alternative options for private roadway property owners to pay for Village services.
- Approved the construction contract for the Public Safety Department renovation project – The Village Board approved a contract for renovation improvements to the Public Safety Department that were approved as part of the 2008 capital improvement bond fund.
- Approved continuation of the discussion of the Steep Slope Ordinance – The Board agreed to bring back the proposed ordinance for reconsideration and directed Village staff to prepare a detailed summary of the complex set of regulations.



The following items are tentatively scheduled for the September and October Village Board meetings:

- Consideration of a leaf disposal contract
 - Consideration of modifications to steep slope regulations
 - Schedule the 2010 Tax Levy Public Hearing
 - Review the Long Range Financial Plan for the Village
 - Consider a cellular antenna lease for the tower located on the Public Works garage. ▼
- Approved discontinuance of the Golf Course Development and the Residential Development Committees – Based on physical and practical difficulties, the Village Board approved the recommendation of the Golf Course Development Committee to not proceed further with the study of the sale of a portion of the golf course to finance a new clubhouse, and to discontinue the committees.

BACK TO SCHOOL

As of Tuesday, August 24, schools are back in session, which involves increased risks for children walking to and from schools and bus stops. To minimize these risks for children, the Public Safety Department reminds motorists to:

- Slow down around schools, playgrounds and parks and watch for children at all times.
- Be aware of and obey bus stop laws and be alert for students running to catch the bus.
- Observe extra caution in bad weather or when the sun obscures vision.

Younger children may be expanding their boundaries for the first time and often are not able to make the split-second decision that is needed in traffic situations. Please be alert. ▼

Voter Registration

October 5, 2010 is the last day to register for the November 2 General Election. If you are not a registered voter, you may register to vote at Village Hall, Monday through Friday between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. Two forms of identification and proof of a current Glencoe address must be furnished in order to register. You may also register to vote at any Office of the County Clerk, including the downtown office located at 69 West Washington and the office in the Skokie Court House.

Please note that if you have recently moved within Glencoe, it is necessary for you to change your voter registration, even if you remain in the same precinct. It is possible to change your voter's registration when you change your driver's license. Just tell the clerk that you wish to do so.

Absentee/Disabled Persons Ballots

Forms to request absentee ballots can be picked up at Village Hall beginning September 23 and need to be mailed to the Cook County Clerk's Office in order to receive an absentee ballot. Applications for a ballot for disabled persons can also be picked up in mid-October.

Early Voting


Illinois voters may take part in early voting, which allows voters to vote before the election without having a reason or excuse. Early voters must vote in person (not by mail) at a designated early voting site. For locations, go to www.cookcountyclerk.com.

2010 PARKWAY LEAF COLLECTION PROGRAM

Beginning Monday, October 11, the Village will again be offering its Parkway Leaf Collection Program service to residents. To ensure that all residents enjoy the benefits of this popular service while reducing the potential risks to children, motorists and pedestrians, please comply with the following guidelines:

1. Leaves should be piled in a row along the parkway in front of your property and should not be placed in the street under any circumstances. A long, low row is better than a single large pile. A long, low row makes collection more efficient and limits the blowing of leaves into the street or back onto your yard.
2. The Village will be operating three parkway leaf collection crews continually during a seven-week program and anticipates passing through every neighborhood 4-5 times between mid-October and the end of November. Please only call the Department of Public Works if two full weeks have passed without your leaves being collected. Unfortunately, we cannot predict when your leaves will be collected during the seven-week service period and we ask for your patience and understanding.
3. If you use a landscape contractor to maintain your yard, the Village asks that the landscape contractor remove the leaves at the time your yard is serviced. Most residents who use landscape contractors are paying for disposal of their leaves as part of their monthly service charge.

In advance, thank you for your cooperation. If you elect not to participate in the 2010 Parkway Leaf Collection Program, the Village will continue to collect yard waste containers with stickers every Wednesday through the end of November. Please call the Public Works Department at 847-835-4111 with questions, or if you need additional information about this service.

POLITICAL SIGNS

In 2008, the Village Board clarified conditions for the display of political signs that announce or support political candidates or issues. Please review the following summary of conditions for the display of political signs in light of up-coming elections.

The ordinance classifies political signs in two categories – “election signs” and “message signs”. Election signs are only those signs specifically advocating on behalf of a person, or a position on a question, to be considered by voters on a ballot that has been certified in accordance with the Illinois Election Code. A “message sign” is a sign other than an election sign expressing a non-commercial message regarding an issue of political or public concern, and can include a sign advocating the election of a particular person. Subject to the requirements summarized below and the general sign illumination regulations of the Village, no permit is required for either category of political signs.

Election Sign Requirements:

- For the November 2, 2010 election, a political election sign may be displayed beginning August 26.
- Signs may be displayed on private property but not on the public right-of-way. In most cases, the public right-of-way begins at the sidewalk, which is approximately 33 feet from the center of the street.
- Signs may be up to 6 square feet in size and a maximum of 4 feet in height from the ground to the top of the sign. The height restriction does not apply to political election signs that may be displayed in a window.
- Signs should be removed immediately after the November 2 Election Day, but no later than November 12. Such election signs can be re-located and maintained, however, if they comply with the message sign requirements.
- No more than one sign per candidate or referendum position shall be permitted on any one property, but there is no restriction on the number of different candidates or referendum positions for which signs may be displayed.

Message Sign Requirements:

- A message sign can be displayed at all times but must be located entirely on private property and may not be displayed in a required setback of a homeowner’s property.


- A general guideline for the area to display a message sign would include the location at or proximate to the structure face (within 10 feet of the front of home, in a window, etc.). Contact the Village Zoning Department (847-835-4111) if you would like more specific guidance for your property.

- Message signs may be up to 6 square feet in size and a maximum of 4 feet in height from the ground to the top of the sign. The height restriction does not apply to political message signs that may be displayed in a window.

- There is no limit on the number of message signs displayed on a property, so long as the total sign area of all such signs does not exceed 30 square feet.

Please review the “typical lot” depiction illustrating the permitted location for the display of election and message signs. For specific information or further clarification contact the Village Hall at 847-835-4111. The Village Zoning Code may also be found at www.villageofglencoe.org. Gasoline-powered leaf blowers are permitted beginning September 15 until December 15. Professional landscapers may operate Monday through Friday, 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m., and Saturday from 9:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. Commercial landscapers are prohibited from working on Sundays and holidays. ▼

SEWER MAINTENANCE

Be careful what you place into the Village sewer system


Public Works staff report that they regularly find cans, bottles and dog waste collection bags in the street inlets and catch basins. All of the Village’s storm sewer systems empty into Lake Michigan or the Chicago River along with all of this debris. Also, please don’t flush disposable towels down the toilet unless they are specifically marketed as biodegradable. These materials can cause blockages and potential basement back-ups. Please put waste in its proper place! ▼

The reduction came from reductions in collections of utility tax, income tax, building permits and interest earnings.

General Fund expenditures were \$568,919 less than the approved budget because all departments in the General Fund finished Fiscal Year 2010 with expenditure levels less than the approved budget.


