LABOR DAY SCHEDULE CHANGES

The Village Hall will be closed on Monday, September 7 in observance of Labor Day.

With the upcoming Labor Day holiday, the Village would like to provide a friendly reminder regarding garbage collection. The Monday collection will be shifted to Tuesday, and the Tuesday collection will be shifted to Wednesday for both refuse and recycling. The Thursday and Friday collection will remain the same. Yard waste will still be collected on Wednesday.

CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS UPDATES

Glencoe Drive Water Main Improvement

Water main replacement is an ongoing component of the Public Works Department's capital improvement program. Water main segments are identified and prioritized for replacement through periodic distribution system studies, as well as historical performance records. The block of Glencoe Drive between Lincoln Avenue and Tudor Court is currently served by a 6-inch water main. The planned improvement will replace and upgrade the water main to an 8-inch diameter and tie it into an existing 8-inch water main on Tudor Court. This will improve pressure and fire flow for the residential properties on Glencoe Drive, as well as better serve the north end of the downtown on Tudor Court, including the new Writers Theatre building. Work on this improvement is expected to begin in mid-September.

Sheridan Road Maintenance Resurfacing Improvement

The State has awarded a \$4.5 million contract to Johnson Paving for the Sheridan Road Maintenance Resurfacing Improvement. Work on this improvement is expected to begin in October and take 6-8 weeks to complete and will consist of milling and resurfacing of a 4.8 mile stretch of Sheridan Road from Lake Cook Rd. to Winnetka Ave.

RECYCLING SERVICES RFP

The Villages of Glencoe and Winnetka this week jointly released a Request-for-Proposals (RFP) for Recycling Materials Collection Services. This joint

RFP describes in detail the services desired which will include the collection and processing of recyclable materials from all single family and multi-family residential properties, commercial properties and municipal sites in the Villages of Glencoe and Winnetka. The RFP will allow both Villages the opportunity to evaluate alternative proposals from qualified vendors including the potential for savings to each community if a joint services contract is awarded. 

THE GLENCOE FARMERS MARKET NEEDS YOU!

As reported in the last Glencoe Quarterly, and as you likely have noticed, the Farmers Market has been on hiatus this year, a decision made by the Chamber of Commerce Board, in consultation with Village staff, recognizing that the current model was in need of a “TuneUp”. In order to receive feedback from residents, an online Farmers Market survey was created in June, and was available at www.glencoetuneup.com, in order to better understand: Whether there was community interest in continuing the market; What day/time was preferred; and What items are most desired. The complete survey results, to date, are available for viewing at www.glencoetuneup.com. Here is a quick summary:

- Nearly half of all respondents attend a few times during the season; a quarter attend weekly;
- Primary issues noted include the market being too small/too few vendors; other area markets provide more variety in types of goods; and the location not visible or ideal;
- Respondents were overwhelmingly positive in terms of supporting an improved market;
- Saturday morning is the preferred day and time; and
- Most desired items include fresh produce, followed by flowers/plants, eggs/cheese/meat, and baked goods.

The next step is to form a Farmers Market steering committee comprised of volunteers interested in working together to envision a new, improved market that is uniquely Glencoe. This approach is a change from past practice of contracting with an outside manager to run the market. WEST NILE VIRUS POSITIVE MOSQUITOS DETECTED IN GLENCOE

The North Shore Mosquito Abatement District (NSMAD) has found West Nile virus positive mosquitos in Glencoe, although no cases have been reported.

The Village of Glencoe and NSMAD remind residents to protect themselves by practicing the following:

- Avoid outdoor activity around dawn and dusk
- Cover exposed skin with loose fitting, light colored clothing
- Use insect repellent
- Check around homes and eliminate potential mosquito breeding sources, particularly any items that can hold water

LIQUOR CODE REVISIONS INFORMATIONAL WEBPAGE

In late 2014, the Village began a comprehensive review of the Village's alcoholic beverage regulations which are codified in Chapter 4 of the Village Code ("Liquor Code"). This review was prompted by a number of temporary liquor license applications for special events that differed from events previously conducted in the Village. After reviewing the Liquor Code and comparing it to more modern regulations of surrounding communities, staff determined there were opportunities to streamline, modernize and improve the Liquor Code.

At the June, July and August Committee of the Whole meetings, staff presented a set of liquor code amendment recommendations to the Village Board. Based on the feedback from these meetings, the Village determined that a complete revision and restatement of Chapter 4 of the Village Code is the clearest and most effective way of implementing the policies and regulations that were discussed at these meetings. Skunks – Prevention & Solutions

Skunks are natural members of the weasel family. Skunks can be carriers of rabies, although no skunk has tested positive in Illinois since 2005. Skunks can be a nuisance; they will spray when threatened and damage landscaping. They will dig through grass in search of grub worms and subsoil insects. A topical application can be applied to your lawn to remove this food source for skunks as well as raccoons. Seek advice from your local garden center or hardware store for the best product for your particular problem.

Habitat:

You will most likely find skunks living under porches, decks, sheds, outbuildings, or foundations. They usually do not make their own homes and may nest in previously occupied burrows from other wildlife. Short-term solutions may be the use of outdoor motion sensor lighting, noise, or castor oil soaked rags. These solutions are only temporary and the best solution is to have them physically removed or block their access into the above mentioned areas.

Removal:

Residents are not permitted to trap and/or kill skunks without a license issued by the Illinois Department of Natural Resources. The Village of Glencoe will only remove wildlife *if they are located within the living space of your home*. For problems or concerns with nuisance wildlife, please contact a removal expert who can recommend the best method for your particular situation. How to prevent future problems:

After you have experienced the problems that only a skunk can cause, you will quickly seek out ways to prevent future encounters. As with all wildlife, keep pet food indoors, secure garbage cans, remove fruit that has fallen from your trees as well as all other food sources, remove brush piles, and seal all holes and entrance points to locations that a skunk may find suitable for a home.

Odor Removal for Pets Having Skunk Encounters:

In a plastic bucket, mix well the following ingredients:

1 quart of 3% Hydrogen Peroxide

¼ cup of baking soda

1-2 teaspoons of Dawn Dish Soap

Wash your pet thoroughly; work the solution deep into the fur. Leave the solution on your pet for at least 5 minutes. Rinse and repeat as needed.

This solution can also be used on clothing. NEVER store any unused solution, discard after each use as pressure may build up and cause the container to burst.

Wright in Glencoe Housewalk

One hundred years ago, Sherman and Elizabeth Booth created the area in Glencoe known as Ravine Bluffs. Sherman Booth was a friend and attorney of noted architect Frank Lloyd Wright.

At Booth's request, Wright designed seven homes, three street markers, a bridge and a now demolished train station for this development.

When combined with previous Wright-designed homes in the village, Glencoe has the third largest concentration of Wright-designed structures in the world.

As part of its year-long celebration of the centennial anniversary of this community treasure, the Glencoe Historical Society has planned this Wright in Glencoe Housewalk .

Participants will have the very rare opportunity to experience a curated tour of Ravine Bluffs, view four of the Wright-designed Glencoe homes and be the first to see a special exhibit on Wright in Glencoe that includes new research and never-before-seen photographs and drawings.

The Featured Homes



The Glasner House

In 1905, Wright designed his first Glencoe home at 850 Sheridan Road for banker William Glasner. It was built as a summer cottage and incorporates many of the early architectural innovations which helped define the Prairie style of architecture – such as a broad overhanging, low pitched roof and ornamental stain glass casement windows.



The Brigham House

In 1908-09, Wright designed a home for Edmund D. Brigham, at 790 Sheridan Road. This home was novel at the time because it was built in concrete and remains the only all concrete home ever built by Frank Lloyd Wright. It also exhibits many of Wright's distinctive Prairie style features – including broad roof overhangs, wood banding and ribbon windows.



The Booth Cottage

This Wright-designed bungalow was built in 1913 and was occupied by Sherman Booth and his family until their principal residence was completed several years later. The home was moved to its current location at 239 Franklin after the main Booth house was built. This house has never previously been opened for public viewing.



The Kissam House

In addition to the Booth Cottage and the main Booth residence, Ravine Bluffs today includes five Wright-designed houses, commissioned by Sherman Booth, all built in 1915. Booth afforded Wright the opportunity to realize his lifelong interest in creating attractive, low-cost housing. The five Ravine Bluffs homes are similar to the \$5000 “Fireproof House” Wright published in *Ladies Home Journal* several years earlier. The interior of the Kissam House will be open for the Wright in Glencoe Housewalk 2015.

A Curated Tour

In addition to interior tours of these four homes, Wright in Glencoe Housewalk participants will receive a special curated tour of Ravine Bluffs.

Visitors will be placed in a small group and assigned to a trained docent who will remain with the group throughout the tour. The docent will lead the group to numerous stops on where other trained docents will discuss aspects of Ravine Bluffs history and its Wright-designed features.

The curated Ravine Bluffs tour includes exterior stops at all of the Wright-designed homes and structures as well as interior tours of the Booth Cottage and the Kissam House.

The New Exhibit

Housewalk participants will also be the first to view an exciting new exhibit on Wright in Glencoe at the Glencoe Historical Society museum at 375 Park Avenue.

GHS members have done extensive new research on the history of Ravine Bluffs and Wright's work in Glencoe, contacting the living descendants of the Booth and Wright families to learn more about the unique story behind this Glencoe treasure.

The exhibit features much of this new information as well as some never-before-seen photographs and materials.

Illinois Rail Safety Week

GLENCOE, IL – During Illinois Rail Safety Week, which runs from September 13th to 19th, the **Glencoe Department of Public Safety** wants to promote safety for both motorists and pedestrians around railroad tracks. The focus for the week will be railroad safety through education and enforcement.

Did you know that Illinois has one of the biggest rail systems in the United States? According to the Illinois Commerce Commission;

- Illinois has more than 7,400 miles of railroad track, the second largest rail system of any state in the nation.
- Chicago is the largest rail hub in the United States and third largest intermodal container/trailer port in the world, following only Singapore and Hong Kong.
- There are over 50 railroad companies that operate their trains in and through Illinois, which is the third highest in the United States.
- About 20 million tons of chemicals, many of which are hazardous, are transported on the rail system within Illinois each year.
- There are 10,249 public highway rail grade crossings located within Illinois.
